#### Western RedCedar Decline

The KNPS guest speaker for October 2021 was Dr. Joey Hulbert, *Forest Health Watch* Program Director at Washington State University. Forest Health Watch is an initiative using a community science approach. The purpose of community science program is two- fold: to accelerate research and find solutions about forest health issues and to empower communities to care for the health of trees and forests so western redcedar remains on the landscape for future generations. He has a background in forest health and is available to answer questions about tree health issues. The program was live on Zoom and recorded for later viewing.

Western redcedar is a culturally, ecologically and economically important tree to western North America, but recent increases in dieback have raised concern about its vulnerability to hotter and dryer climates.

In the Northwest, western redcedar is considered a Tree of Life. The roots, bark, wood and boughs all are used (i.e., shelter, textiles, transportation). In the inland northwest western redcedar is an important rot resistant building material used for decking, canoes, shingles. As a water loving species it has a role in forest health by helping with soil stability, water filtration, improving air quality and shade for fish habitat.

There has been a gradual decline in western redcedar, grand fir and big leaf maple forest health over the last 10 years. Drone flyovers are documenting western redcedar dieback on edge of forests, middle of forests, urban infrastructures, even on well-watered golf greens. Particularly concerning is the medium and young treetop dieback and thinner foliage. Due to global warming trends in the Northwest, fungus disease and invasive beetles are getting a toehold when trees are stressed by hotter/longer droughts.

The smartphone app iNaturalist is a popular tool for sharing pics of areas of healthy or dieback western redcedar trees (checkout the Research Projects link under Foresthealth.org website for more information). When

sharing pictures with Forest Health Watch, it is helpful to share GPS locations. Targeted "hot spot" areas of vulnerable trees, are further investigated to check on additional environmental/topographic predictors. Additional information added to the database could include: seasonal vs permanent stream, open field site vs urban, directional facing slope, temperature of water/soil, elevation, fungus, or invasive insect damage. If restoration is possible, the gathered data will help determine which seeds or conservation measures will adapt better to that locale.

Data on western redcedar is sparse for the northern panhandle of Idaho. If you are interested in finding out more about the Forest Health Watch program and how you can help, contact foresthealth.org, or Joey Hulbert at <a href="https://hulbe@wsu.edu">hulbe@wsu.edu</a>.
