"Community Food Systems" Diane Green, of Greentree Naturals

A stellar start for our 2007 Program Series, Diane will be discussing "Community Food Systems." Following a relevant analysis of the food systems concept, she will focus on the implications food systems have on the way we eat. How can our diets help achieve sustainable local community-based food systems? There is growing recognition that the food choices we make everyday can have important impacts on our food system. Diane's farm, Greentree Naturals, has been certified organic since 1992 and gardening organically for over three decades. For ten years she has been teaching the organic gardening classes for the UI Master Gardening program and she also teaches an organic workshop series at the farm with student apprentices from all over the U.S. who come to learn about organic production. Diane serves on the State of Idaho Department of Agriculture Organic Foods Advisory Council and is an advisor for the UI College of Agriculture representing small acreage farmers for the State of Idaho. Diane is a favorite of our chapter, and we are excited to have her speak with us.

"Plants, Fire, and Climate Change" will pack the Community Hall in February. Sam Cushman, research landscape ecologist, Rocky Mountain Research Station, wowed the audience at the October, 2006 Wild Idaho North conference sponsored by ICL. His information on ecosystems and climate change was so powerful we knew we needed him to speak to our membership. After receiving his BS in ecology from Evergreen State College, he went on to conduct research in the Russian Far East on forest fire and logging as

drivers of landscape change, receiving his MS from Western Washington University. He earned his PhD at the University of Massachusetts by researching relationships between wildlife populations and habitat at multiple spatial scales. Since 2003 he has been working for the US Forest service on a variety of topics including climate change, forest ecosystem dynamics, wildlife habitat, population monitoring and adaptive management.

Committee Reports

Arboretum Report

After eight seasons the arboretum is really taking shape with the tender loving care of our wonderful team of volunteer gardeners. There were fifteen of them this year. All of the foundation plants are doing very well. Our focus again this year was to get more of the low growing flowering plants established. The ones that we planted in past years bloomed well to add a lot of color and interest. Our one and only mature lodgepole pine had to be cut down this year. It had reached the end of its life span. We planted two young lodgepole pines several years ago as part of the Arbor Day Ceremony so the species is still represented. This year we planted three black cottonwood trees, a species that was missing. Unfortunately vandals cut down five of our young trees on the east end (two young birch – one of which is trying to come back, two larch which will have to be replaced, and one mountain ash, which will come back).

Our paid coordinator, Rochelle Chatburn, did a fantastic job of keeping everything running smoothly, greeting visitors, pulling weeds and pruning along the gravel paths and assisting the gardeners with extra watering during the week. She was a hard worker, always on time, cheerful and friendly. She was a real asset to the operation of the arboretum this past season

All of the gardeners take pride in watching things grow and knowing that they are the reason why. It is such a thrill to have visitors stop and tell us how much they enjoy walking through the area. The museum appreciates the arboretum for giving visitors something to enjoy while they wait for the doors to open.
