January's Program



"Special Forest Products"

Chris Schnepf of the University of Idaho, Extension Education, told the Kinnikinnick Chapter about forest products that are harvested from public lands. Because Idaho and the Inland Northwest have a vast amount of land owned by the Forest Service, it is available to those that wish to use these products, be it for commercial or personal use.

Often in the case of wood gathering, a permit is required.

Chris reported on the harvest of wild mushrooms done by commercial pickers and private individuals. Morels, chanterelles, boletes, and matsutake mushrooms brought in \$20,267,080 to pickers in 1992. Other products such as floral greens, moss, western red cedar, western white pine, subalpine fir and pinecones were amassed for a total of \$42,520,319, given as the value in 1989.

Chris presented slides of these products along with figures that proved very interesting to the audience. Participants had a long question and answer period with him at the end of the talk.


February's Program

**Kinnikinnick Journal - Message from the President

February 15-16, I had the pleasure of attending the 21st Idaho Rare Plant Conference in Boise. INPS (Idaho Native Plant Society) and Idaho Fish and Game's Conservation Data Center jointly present the conference. It is mainly a gathering of agency botanists statewide reviewing the status of rare plants – are the populations thriving or sinking, are there new discoveries, do particular populations need more or less protection? It's also an educational opportunity – sagebrush was the topic this year. I had expected to be bored but was anything but. It's a misunderstood ecology under siege by ranchers and the agencies that serve them. I had not appreciated the abundance of wildlife and other plants sheltered and nourished by the Artemnesia.

The botanic profession benefits from the young women who have taken to field work. One of my favorites looks up at her slide and comments, "Isn't this a cute plant? Aren't those flowers adorable?" It's catching, and the warmth lasts even as she launches into botanic Latin and rangeland management talk. There's also the drama of botanists fighting for fences to protect small, tasty populations, federal agencies suppressing research they disagree with, and now at my third conference, friends statewide to catch up with. I recommend it highly.

At this meeting, a special honor was bestowed by the Board of INPS at the recommendation of President Steve Rust. Kinnikinnick founder, Lois Wythe, was named a "Life Member" of INPS for her outstanding, long-term service. Three other life members were also approved, bringing the statewide total to eight. We are grateful that Lois's exceptional contribution in founding our chapter has been so widely honored!

As your chapter president, I serve on the INPS statewide board. It meets quarterly, including at the Annual Meeting in midsummer and at the Rare Plant Conference. Getting Sage Notes published regularly again was a big topic for the board – and a committee is forming to accomplish that with President Steve Rust overseeing. We continue to be the chapter with the best member involvement, but Pahove Chapter in Boise contributes the most help at the state level. 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ARBOR DAY -- APRIL 29, 2005

Arbor Day will be celebrated at the North Idaho Native Plant

Elementary school children and the general public are invited to attend the events of the day. The Native Plant Society will be hosting Arbor Day for the 7th year.

"Trees are Terrific... and Energy Wise!" is this year's National Arbor Day theme. Activities planned for the day include: guided tours of the arboretum with an emphasis on tree identification; tree coring demonstrations by Fields Cobb and composting demonstrations by Pat Van Volkinburg. The members of the Kinnikinnick Chapter of the Idaho Native Plant Society will also be planting a Yew tree within the Arboretum during the day. We are adding a tree identification game for the children and we hope to involve the school children in a contest making posters and writing poetry related to this year's theme. At noon an Arbor Day proclamation will be presented by the Mayor of Sandpoint and a Tree City USA proclamation will be presented by Bill Love representing the Idaho Department of Lands. At the conclusion of the speeches, the winners of this year's poster and poetry contest will be acknowledged. Throughout the day over a thousand seedlings will be given away to those seeking native trees and shrubs to plant on their own property. The species we expect to offer this year include: Chokecherry, Serviceberry, Red-osier Dogwood, Aspen, Ponderosa Pine, Paper Birch, Western Larch, and Douglas Fir. Members of the Kinnikinnick Chapter of the INPS are encouraged to participate in the Arbor Day celebration by attending the events and volunteering to be escort/docents and to help with the activities.
