Fall Presentations

Chris Schnepf's September Program on 'Backyard Forests' was packed with information for those with woodland acres of 5 or less acres. He spoke of how the forest ecology was

affected by climate, soils, water, genetics, and disturbances. Forest succession was explained as temporary plant communities which are replaced by more stable communities, unless disturbance interrupts. Root disease was explained as the number one killer of trees in North Idaho. Chris spoke at length on the value of proper thinning in protecting the health of a forest. Todd Crossett was also on hand and spoke about change coming to Bonner County due to the rapid population increase seen recently & projected into the future. It was great to hear about the work of an ad hoc committee, on which INPS president Carol Jenkins was an integral part. Also that the Kinnikinnick Chapter native plant list was the preferred guide to planting material for a 40 foot buffer between development and waterways in order to protect water quality.

October's Program featured Larry **Evans** of the Western Mycological Society based in Missoula, MT. Larry presented a very lively and informative look at the fall mushrooms that inhabit the proposed Scotchmans Peak Wilderness area. Friends of the Scotchmans Peak Wilderness Area was a co-sponsor of the event which included a slide show followed by a field trip to the Ross Creek Cedars in Montana. Larry covered many aspects of the northwest's edible mushrooms including their culture, symbiotic relationships, growth habits, gathering and culinary uses. Some of the fungi covered included the boletes, suillus, cantharellus, aminita, armillaria, hygrophorus, russula, the ever popular Matsutaki and others.

Membership Information: A Note on Dues

The newsletter's envelope label now shows the year through which your dues are paid, above your name. Dues are payable January 1st with April 1st the deadline to maintain that years' membership. For your convenience, a membership form is included with the newsletter. Thank you for renewing! Dues paid to the Chapter are shared with the Idaho Native Plant Society (INPS) so you are automatically a member of the State Society. A membership form will be included in the January issue of the Sage Notes (the Society Newsletter). If you have not renewed at that time, consider the form as a reminder, but please renew through the Chapter. It helps the Chapter when you use the form included with our Kinnikinnick Journal since there can be up to a six month delay before we learn of renewals through INPS.

Idaho Native Plant Society (INPS) recently increased their dues for 2009 and added a new member category. Patron dues have been increased to \$100 and the new category, "Sustaining," has been added at \$45. The State dues for all other categories have been increased by \$2, but you will not see this change on the renewal form. Since the action by INPS was taken late in the year, your Chapter Board decided not to increase its dues structure for the Senior, Student, Individual and Household categories. In June 2009, we will reevaluate our financial condition based on the success of our springtime fund raising activities to determine if we can continue to absorb the State dues increase for the following year.
