"Landowner's Guide to Sustainable Forestry" Dr. Nancy Gilliam


Our series of speakers and field trips continued to be popular, fun and educational – we enjoyed Bill Love's perspectives on the timber industry, Jerry Pavia took us on a personal tour of many gardens through his photography, Chris Buchler brought us Blue Birds and we ventured out of doors into the field to see many different native plant habitats.

In April we combined efforts with others in the community to raise knowledge and awareness about Eurasian milfoil and the threats this invasive plant poses to our aquatic native habitats. We successfully applied for, and received, a grant to continue our milfoil education efforts with signage at the Waterlife Discovery Center. Arbor Day was, once again, a huge success with over 200 students visiting the arboretum to learn about, and celebrate trees. In May, we took a walk through the ages of the arboretum. More than a mere stroll down memory lane, we were able to watch the arboretum literally grow over the years and learn more about its inception and its ongoing inspiration. The bench classes (Photos Below) continue to raise funds for the arboretum and are a rewarding way for participants to learn about working with Alder – and they actually walk away with a bench to sit upon. Others did their part to raise arboretum funds by tipping their glasses and sipping some fine wines at Pend Oreille Pasta.

The INPS annual meeting was held in June at nearby Farragut State Park, we had the opportunity to spend time with many Native Plant Society members from around Idaho and showcase some of what makes our region so special.

Toby Spribille returned to take us on another visit to the wonderful world of lichens. Our conservation committee remained engaged in forest planning and other issues. The Landscape committee members continue their stewardship of some of our areas gems, the Mickinnick Trailhead, the Waterlife Discovery Center and the Healing Garden. Our newsletter team continues to bring us a quality newsletter and many people in our community have a new appreciation for native plants.
